The History of The New England College of Optometry

The College had its beginnings in the mid-1890's when a Boston ophthalmologist, Dr. August A. Klein, recognized the need for a new profession. With Dr. Klein's new school of optics, the stage was set for the evolution of a new profession: optometry. The beginnings of both the profession and Dr. Klein's mission were humble enough. In its first year, the Klein School of Optics employed seven instructors who taught classes in optical instruments, refraction and physiology,



spectroscopy, anatomy, photographical optics, astronomy and mechanical optics. The program of study was one year long and two students graduated at the end of the first year.

As time went on, the Klein School of Optics and the new profession of optometry gained popularity and support. By 1903, 166 students had completed the Klein program. In 1909, the program expanded to a two-year course offered as the last two years of high school education.



The Klein School of Optics changed its name to the Massachusetts School of Optometry in 1919 and by 1930 required four years of high school prior to enrolling in the two-year program. At this time, the profession of optometry was making rapid advancements. Practitioners were becoming recognized as the primary providers of vision care and the scope of the field was expanding. The curriculum at the Massachusetts School of Optometry expanded to three years in 1934 and to four years in 1939.

By 1950, the institution, by then called the Massachusetts College of Optometry, received the authority to grant the Doctor of Optometry degree. Two years of college were now required for admission. In 1976, the College changed its name to The New England College of Optometry to reflect more accurately its regional constituency.

Today, The New England College of Optometry provides a four year professional curriculum backed by fifty full-time equivalent faculty. The academic and clinical programs have been greatly expanded to reflect the changes in the profession. With the expanding scope of optometry in the treatment and management of eye health conditions, the curriculum has placed increasing emphasis on biosciences. The clinical education program blends together the students' theoretical knowledge with actual patient care.

The Facilities

The College's main classroom and building are located on Beacon Street in Boston's historic "Back Bay" neighborhood. This beautiful section of the city was at one time a shallow bay. The bay was filled and the reclaimed land area was made available for new construction in the mid-1800's.

Namais Hall

This building located at 424 Beacon Street was named after one of the College's most memorable professors, Dr. Foster Namais. It was designed by J.H. Schweinforth and built in 1904. Its interior is distinguished by a four-story spiral staircase capped by circular stained glass window.

Namais Hall houses classrooms, a cafeteria, the bookstore, administrative offices and many instructional laboratories.

The Library

The College library building was constructed in 1894. It was the childhood home of Emily Sears, who later became Mrs. Henry Cabot Lodge. Its opulence reflects the tastes of the wealthy elite of Boston at

that time. The interior is graced with handcarved wooden paneling, marble fireplaces and handpainted guilt wallcoverings.



The city's early elite may have pompously called Boston the "Hub of the Universe" yet we, as students, affectionally called it our "home-away-from-home" for four years. It's hard to believe that

we spent so many years of our lives studying and living in one of the most historically important cities in the country.



I suppose I could go into the historical aspects of Boston but you can easily look that up in any textbook. Besides, I don't think those are the aspects of Boston that we will remember when we're old and grey. Rather, we will remember the little pleasures and seemingly insignificant everyday buildings and businesses we took for granted in Boston --- like the Ultimate Bagel on Newbury Street, the


Coffee Connection which turned into Starbucks right by the Hynes Convention T station, Tower Records, beer and darts at Crossroads, cheap food and 5 cent photocopying at the Quality Mart, The Pour House, the food court at 'the Pru', strolling around the Copley Plaza, and seeing movies at the Sheri.

It's these little things about Boston that we'll cherish forever because they were such an integral part of our lives. So, if ever you find yourself in Boston again, go back and visit your favourite spots and just take a moment to remember all the good old times.








Imagine yourself sitting on a train continuously, day and night, for 51 days *straight*!!! That's the cumulative equivalent of how many days Jerry Zeltzer spent travelling from Rhode Island to Boston for four years almost every single day!

Volunteer Optometrists in Service to Humanity (V.O.S.H.)

I first learned about VOSH as a second year student. I got involved knowing only that VOSH was a group of students and doctors that travelled to third world countries to give eye exams and distribute eyeglasses. In November 1995, I travelled as a member of VOSH to Merida, Mexico where I witnessed how prescription glasses or medications can totally change people's lives. Some of our patients had never seen clearly before. Others broke down and cried when they first looked through their new glasses. I was amazed at how desparate and needy these people were for a service we could easily provide.

This photo is one of my patients I saw during my first VOSH trip. She is only 6 years old and had spent her life with blurry vision. I was watching her playing with a new toy while waiting in line. She was holding the toy almost to her nose to see it clearly. After seeing her and many patients like her, I wanted to get much more involved with VOSH. When we returned to Boston, I ran for VOSH president and was elected. I was very nervous about taking the position of VOSH president because I knew that thousands of people were



counting on us in Mexico. I had never been in charge of something of this magnitude before. I had overwhelming support from all the members. They were always willing to help out and were always enthusiastic about what they were doing.

The patients that VOSH members examine do not have any practical access to eye care. Many of our patients in Mexico live in houses with that ched roofs and no electricity or running water. The cost of a pair of prescription glasses is equivalent to one week's salary. They rely solely on the VOSH mission to provide them with proper eye care. VOSH members see most of their patients once. This gives us only one chance to properly refract, diagnose and treat any problems they may have.

As VOSH president, I was in charge of two trips -- the VOSH#1 mission to Merida, Mexico in November 1996 and the VOSH#2 mission to Chetumal, Mexico in February 1997. In total, over 5300 patients were seen and over 7000 pairs of prescription glasses were dispensed. We also treated numerous cases of eye diseases and infections and brought boxes of stuffed animals for the children.

If it was not for the help of Pete Paradis (vice president) and all the VOSH officers, these two trips would never have been as successful. It was an immense pleasure to be in charge of VOSH. I feel that I learned a great deal from the experience. My memories of the two trips are deeply treasured. I am so very proud of the work the VOSH group accomplished. Every member showed the professionalism and genuine concern for their patients that make them the fine doctors that they are today. I would like to thank Student Council'96-'97 for their full support. In addition, I would also like to thank Dr. Paul White for his personal contributions to VOSH.





















In order to be eligible for a VOSH mission, students were required to donate a minimum of 40 hours of their time doing various tasks in preparation for the mission. There were glasses to be sorted, washed, read and packaged. Crates of prepared glasses had to be organized. Funds needed to be raised. Students went on local vision screenings for the Lions Club. In the end, VOSH was able to raise over \$19,000 in funds. A total of 44% of the OD3 class became eligible to attend one of either two VOSH missions this year which made it the very first time that VOSH organized two separate trips in a single year.
