A history of us is a review
Of what was great, and bad, and new.

H I S T O R Y



Sometimes a laugh can ease the pain
When you look at something once again.



It should have been an omen. The first night we arrived at school we found it wasn't there anymore. We were halfway through the welcoming banquet before we realized that the "new facility" was not a new seat in the restroom but a whole new college. The change was needed. The Horace Mann building was a nice place to visit, but nobody

would want to live there. On second thought, it wasn't even a nice place to visit. We were soon asked what we thought optometry was. After we had given our answer we were told it



wasn't like that already, it soon wouldn't be, or it might cease to exist altogether. After just a few more weeks it became clear that optometry students weren't the only ones a little hazy on this question.

First year saw the big move to the new building. Many of us helped. We soon discovered it was a lot safer to walk from Newbury to Beacon than to ride with whomever was driving the truck. Dr. Baldwin visited the class for the first time and told us that tuition was going up. In statistics class we studied the bi-modal curve but we did our homework in the cafeteria.



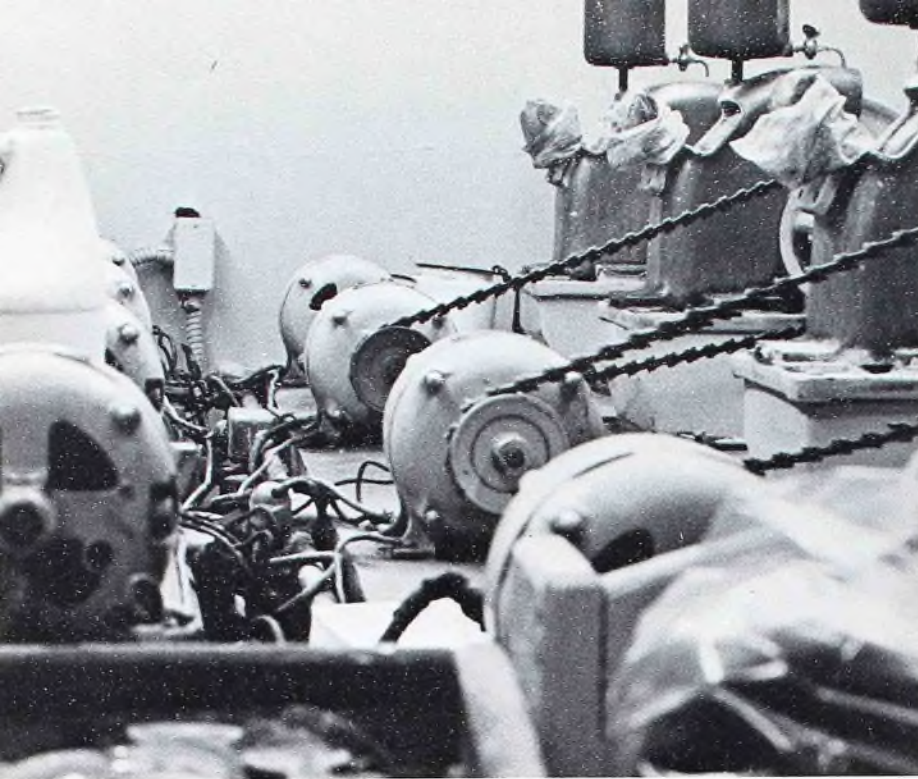
There was some worry about driving cars into Boston, but the local car thieves did their best to relieve us of this problem.

Dr. Namias remarked that some of us knew nothing while others knew less. We soon realized that this statement was applicable to other people as well as students.

The traumatic highlight of the year was our optometry practical.

For some reason there was a rash of stomach pain and nervous headache that week. But all, or at least most, survived and on we went to the second year having learned that an optometrist does do more than throw a pair of spectacles on somebody's face.





Second year brought the excellence of Marshall Mark who soon became our image of the ideal clinician. Dr. Baldwin came for a second visit and he said

that tuition was going up. We found that Mass College was a breeding ground for rumors, mostly untrue, and for memos, often painfully true. It was found that the life expectancy for a motorcycle was little beyond that for a car. Monkeys were giving their lives to science and proving that the more we learn about vision the harder it is to believe that we see at all. The green flash was alive and well and living at Charley's. I would write more, but I'm not sure there was anymore.



Third year brought our first experience with the clinic and it was a whole new ballgame, of course it was the same ballpark. We began to realize that dealing with people is a lot more complicated than reading about it in a book. It was a frightening experience to be locked in a room with your first real live patient; some of us were so scared we didn't come out for three of four hours. Well, they couldn't say they weren't getting a thorough



exam. It wasn't the exam they didn't like, it was coming back on the second day to be verified that they weren't so crazy about. Some of these people just couldn't get it straight that there is a blur, a break, and a recovery. General clinic was full of surprises. Sometimes the equipment even worked. Careful research revealed that the new members of the



class were not wearing scarlet "S's" on their underwear. In pathology lab we practiced gonioscopy and sometimes even left the epithelium where we found it.

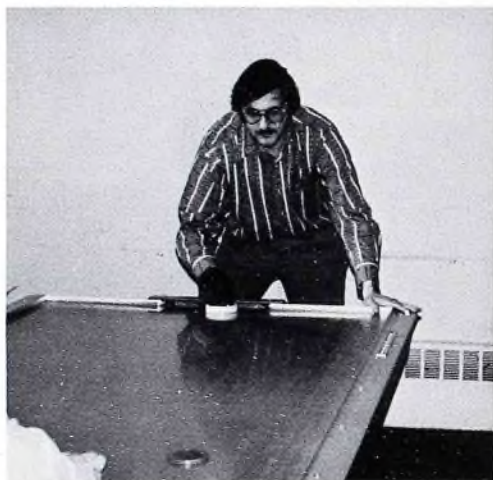


The dogs started coming to class for they always found an empty chair. Dr. Richmond told us about children. Dr. Mohindra told us about children. They must have been talking about different kids. Dr. Baldwin sent in Dr. Walkowiak to tell us that tuition was going up. Dr. Christensen's notes helped get us through the boards. We studied for them like crazy only to find out that the person who wrote them had failed to read the topic outline.





Fourth year and the end is near. Hockey elbow is a strange new disease. Some started in July, the rest in October. Thus half of the group graduated three months before the rest. Well, there is no sense in always being traditional. Four months before the end of



school the faculty decided that God shouldn't be the only one to have to work on Sunday. Dr. Baldwin came to say good-bye and never even mentioned tuition. Almost without our knowing it a change had taken place. We found ourselves in clinics all over Boston and strangely enough we knew something. Not that we knew everything, I guess no one does, but we were able to recognize problems and often do something about them. A rose tint is not so bad if it makes a patient feel better. I think everyone remembers the first time a patient said, "Thanks, Doc." We realize now that all the psychology, physics, optics, pathology, and pharmacology does tie together. We go out now, for this fourth year was not our last but

only the first. We now have a better idea of what an optometrist does, but the boundaries have not yet been set and the possibilities are limitless.

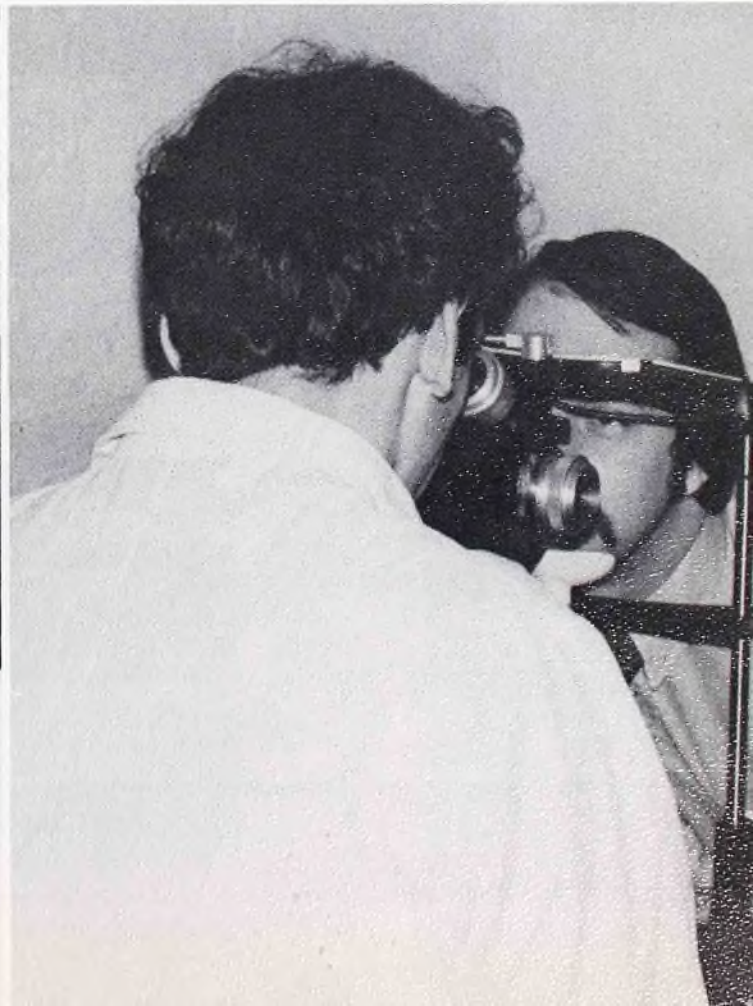
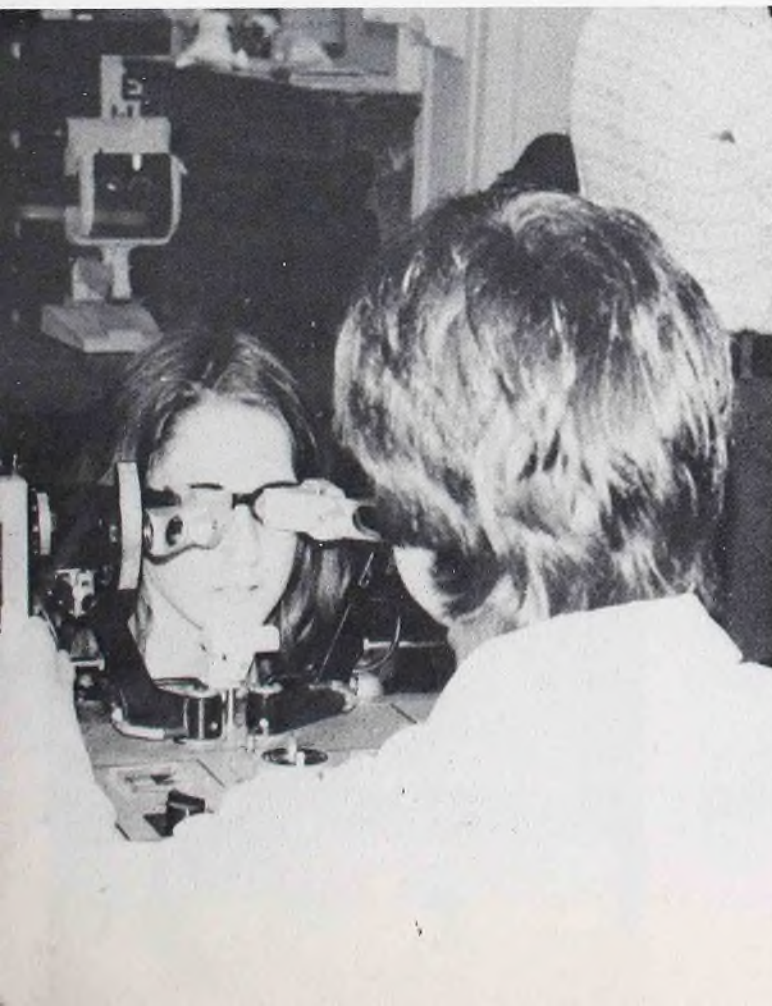
