### **Course Description**

This course provides a systematic analysis of a range of social welfare policies and programs and their impact on individuals, families, groups, organizations and communities. Through the use of analytical and experiential learning, emphasis is placed on developing policy practice skills to promote social, environmental and economic justice, equality, equity and human rights within the context of political, legislative and community processes.

### **Student Learning Objectives/Outcomes**

Upon completion of this course, the learner will be able to:

1. Demonstrate an understanding of social welfare policy and programs as a major component of Generalist Social Work Practice and the interrelationship between such policy and programs and the Social Work profession.



2. Utilize conceptual frameworks to analyze the historical, political, economic and social contexts within which social welfare policy and programs are constructed.
3. Incorporate Social Work values into social welfare policy analysis and practice, with particular emphasis on respect and appreciation for diversity as well as the promotion of social and economic justice and work to reconcile personal and professional value conflicts within policy development and advocacy.
4. Identify and examine the role of social welfare policy and programs in relation to the local, national and global connectedness concerning human rights, aspects of diversity, and discrimination and oppression.
5. Demonstrate utilization of (local, state, national or international) some of the political, organizational, and community processes to effectively influence social welfare policy and programs in ways that support human rights and the values of the social work profession.

## **CSWE Competencies**

### **Portfolio (300 points, 30% of total grade)**

Consider the portfolio as a weekly worksheet. You will integrate the course readings with your experiences (especially your social action campaign experiences) throughout the portfolio. You may discuss the questions with your classmates, but each student must complete and submit their own portfolio assignments.

### **Advocacy Skills Assignments (300 points, 30% of total grade)**

Consider the advocacy skills assignments as preparation for participating in the Mental Health Matters Day event. Participation in the Event on March 11<sup>th</sup> and the debriefing on March 15<sup>th</sup> is required.

### **Campaign Assignments (300 points, 30% of total grade)**

Students will engage in policy advocacy through a social action campaign. Campaign assignments include issue identification, testing the issue and demands, developing an organizational rap, launching the campaign, creating a campaign binder, and delivering a final presentation.

### **Extra Credit (3% of total grade)**

The virtual Spring '26 Summit on College Student Social Action will take place on Thursday, May 7<sup>th</sup>, 3:00-5:00 pm. This event provides a great opportunity for you to connect with students across the country who are working on social action campaigns and to learn from one another. Students may earn up to 3% extra credit for participating in this event.

## Attendance (required) 10% of final grade

This course requires attendance because it is an essential element in the learning process.

**Medical leaves sanctioned by Health Services are the only excused absences.** Based on the number of times a week a course meets, students are allowed a certain number of absences without a grade penalty. Additional absences, up to the total allowed before department review, will result in a deduction of the attendance grade (which is 10% of the total course grade). Department review will be initiated when any student meets the total allowed number of absences, considering the reasons for absences and student's overall course performance. Exceeding the total number of allowed absences may result in additional grade penalties or failing the course. Students who wish to have excused absences due to bereavement must follow the Siena University Bereavement Policy. In order for a bereavement absence to be excused an email must come from the VPAA's office. The Bereavement Policy is discussed further in the syllabus.

Students are responsible for monitoring their attendance. It is expected that students communicate with the instructor in advance of an absence. This models professional behavior, and workplace expectations.

## Class Policies

### Social Work Department Policy on Graded Assignments

1. All major assignments must be submitted in order to pass the course, regardless of the grade earned on the assignment.
2. Assignments are expected on the due date
3. If the assignment is going to be late, you are expected to contact the professor via email to negotiate any extension before the due date - this models professional behavior

### Your Professor's Policy on Graded Assignments

1. Even if an extension is approved, assignments that are not turned in on the due date will receive a deduction of 10% of the overall grade (an assignment worth 100 points will now only be graded for a maximum of 90 points)
2. Students who do not request an extension prior to the due date will receive an additional 10% deduction off the overall grade (an assignment worth 100 points will now only be graded for a maximum of 80 points)
3. Without a negotiated extension, a final submission date will be set by the instructor. If the assignment is not submitted by that date, a '0' grade will be assigned. Regardless of grade earned, all major assignments must still be submitted to and accepted by the professor in order to pass the class.
