HEILIGENDAMM

Bad Doberan/Heiligendamm, some 10 miles west of Rostock on the Baltic coast, lays claim to the first German sea resort.

Heiligen Damm was visited by Franz I, Duke of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, in 1793. The resort was patterned after similar resorts in England.

Elements which favor the area as a resort include a mild climate, beech woods in the area for walking and a relatively calm ebb and flow of the sea. About 20 miles of the coastline, from Rerik to Warnemuende, could be considered sandy bathing beach, backed by hillsides covered with trees.

Since 1850 Lindenallee has connected Bad Doberan with Heiligendamm, some five miles. Built over a six-week period in 1886, a railroad spur has connected the two towns. The spur was continued to Kuehlungsborn in 1910. "Molli" is the affectionate name given to the train.


After 1948 Kur clinics were organized in the area, named in 1990 the "Ostsee-Klinik Heiligendamm." Treatments include ailments of allergies, heart problems and common diseases.




For more than 200 years, Heiligendamm has been known as the "White City on the Baltic Sea." A large portion of the coastal area has been incorporated into a single municipality, Bad Doberan/Heiligendamm, but includes many former towns in the area.


Doberan received the prefix name of "Bad" in 1921. In 1993, Heiligendamm observed its 200 year jubilee.



A race track established in 1822 in Bad Doberan has attracted racing enthusiasts. A featured horse at the time was "Highflyer." Foreword

THE publisher feels that a word of commendation is due the contributors and collaborators who so willingly assisted in making this volume of official Decorative Geldprints, a successful reality.

The many technical difficulties which appeared in connection with the display of these prints, were immediately overcome because of their expert advice.

The problem, for instance, of mounting the prints with the application of paste, without damaging either side of the print (for in most cases the prints were equally handsome on both sides) was finally solved, through the extensive use of rubber cement as an adhesive. This satisfactory method not only enabled us to hold the delicate little print to the mount, but we could easily "detach and replace" the print without marring.



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We continue the account of the "Decorative Geldprints" which appeared in the March 1997 issue of THE FRAKTUR. The illustrations above are of Notgeld, without identification, but include both Heller (Austrian) and Pfennig (German) values.

Included in a purchase of German paper money literature was a treatise on "Trillion" Mark German Notgeld of 1923, according to Dwight Musser, Box 905, Lacoochee, Fla. 33537.

The 32-page list extracts the notes from the eight-volume work by Dr. Arnold Keller, "Das Notgeld der deutschen Inflation 1923," published in Berlin in February 1958. The eight volumes were combined into two volumes and reprinted by Dr. Ernst Battenberg in Munich in 1975.

It should be pointed out that not all high inflation notes were issued by cities or banks; many were issued by private firms. The German railroad system produced notes in various cities, called Reichsbahndirektion issues.

Musser explains that the German equivalents for higher values include the Million, 1,000,000; Milliard, 1,000,000

and Billion, 1,000,000,000,000.

Musser spices the pages with English translations of terms in German. He notes that the "Trillion" booklet differs from the Keller text in the omission of size of serial numbers, use of prefix No. or Nr., and use of seals and signatures.

Basically, two lists appear in the work: identification by Keller number, town, date, denomination and Keller price in Deutsche Mark. A second section is shorter, and lists variations of notes, such as color, watermarks and serial numbers.

Two pages illustrate watermarks.

Musser concludes the work with a bibliography of works by Dr. Keller. Cost of the volume is \$5, from Musser.

Serienscheine Notgeld issued in the name of "Jungdeutsche Orden" is illustated and described in a 48-page, small format, book prepared by Kai Lindman, Sassenburg, Germany.

The German-language volume cites Notgeld issued in various cities in the name of the youth group, using the same catalog number as appears in the book "Serienscheine."

Lindman explains that the youth group was founded by Artur Mahraun, born Dec. 30, 1890 in Kassel. He served in the German army, then attended the university in Jena. In 1919 he headed a radical group which targeted German youth.

The group gained political power, and was formally organized on Feb. 22, 1920, as the Jungdeutschen Orden, Jungdo, with Mahraun grand master. Influence of the group spread into France and Austria. The organization was built upon during the NAZI reign under Hitler.
