TRANSITION OBJECTIVE

Students will learn vocabulary and read a story about civic duty.

RELEVANCE TO SUCCESSFUL TRANSITION

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STEP 4: Activity - 25 Minutes

Tell students they will be involved with an election during the next week. Before the election process starts, it is important for everyone to understand the vocabulary that will be used. **Civic Duty** is the focus of the vocabulary list. Participating in elections by voting is a civic duty. Distribute the handout **Civic Duty Word List**. Using examples, go over the vocabulary words with the students, matching the words with the definitions. Circulate through the room to offer assistance and encouragement.

STEP 5: Activity - 20 Minutes

Read or have a student read the story **A Helping Hand** to the class. Discuss student reactions to the story.

Ask students why people become involved in organizations (group membership, business associations and belief in the activities of the organization). Discuss how organizations can help others, such as feeding the hungry, supporting people who are ill, working with children and preserving nature.
