13 Complete the Process for Choosing a College

TRANSITION OBJECTIVE

Students will learn about college requirements and programs and will evaluate several colleges.

RELEVANCE TO SUCCESSFUL TRANSITION

Going to college requires many steps before classes ever begin. When high school students visit a college campus, their first-hand information will give them a better understanding of college life and requirements. It also can stimulate new questions and concerns to discuss.

INSTRUCTIONAL SEQUENCE

□ STEP 1: Update Journal

STEP 2: Convene Roundtable

"One new thing I know about going to college is _____."

□ STEP 3: Advance Organizer

"Today you will learn all of the steps and timelines you must meet to attend college."



STEP 4: Activity - 2 Days

Use this lesson as a college awareness exercise for all students. Introduce the handouts **A Step-by-Step College Guide**. Break students into pairs for pair/share activities. Explain that since there are many steps and deadlines, it is important to start working on these several years before applying for college. Go through each section of **A Step-by-Step College Guide**.



- One at a time, introduce the topic for each of the 11 sections and ask pairs to discuss one or two things they might learn from this section. Spend up to six minutes for each section.
- Student pairs read through the sections, assisting each other with unfamiliar vocabulary or if needed, read sections aloud to the class. After reading, pairs take notes on the **College Note Guide**, describing two or three facts

□ STEP 5: Activity - 1 Day

Review the **Timelines and To Do List**. Read through the list with students and instruct them to check all areas that have been completed. Students will then develop a set of steps for each of these areas and a timeline for completing each step.

□ STEP 6: Activity - 1 Day

Students complete the handout Selecting the Right College. To complete this activity, students need to visit a college or use brochures, the Internet and phone calls to collect information. Discuss cost of college, tuition and financial aid. With the information they have aathered, help them compare costs across two colleges, including entrance fees, tuition and courses. Go over the handout with students, explaining the information they will need to gather. Next, using the handout have students rate the colleges that interest them. After they complete the handout their score will indicate the most appropriate college. In small groups, have students complete the handout Selecting the Right College.

STEP 7: Evaluate Outcomes

STEP 8: Connecting Activity

Have students contact a college to get the requirements and timelines for admission. Students should report this to the class. Advanced students can go to the College Board website (<u>http://www.collegeboard.</u> <u>com/student/pay/add-it-up/401.html</u>) and calculate how to pay for college. This is also a good activity for students and parents.
