STEP 4: Activity - 15 Minutes

Tell students they will be paid for two weeks of work. Have each student write out and bring their sample paycheck for the two weeks of work to make a deposit (use amounts from *Lesson 4*). Students fill out deposit slips and deposit the money in their account. Next, students budget their money to pay for rent and car payments.



STEP 5: Activity - 30 Minutes

Have students form groups of four, joining with another pair of roommates. Together. they will play **The Furniture Game**. First, go over **Finding Furniture Fast** and explain the object and the rules of the game. Next, have students in each group take turns rolling a die to find out from what group they may use to choose a piece of furniture. They may choose what they wish, but they must have enough money to pay for the item. Roommates may team together to get the items on the list. The first set of roommates to get everything on their list will be the winners. You may want to provide a prize or privilege to the winners. Students use the handout **Checks** to write checks for their purchases. Students also need to enter their check totals into the **Check Register** and figure their balance. To end this lesson have students mark the square labeled, *Furnish Your New Place*, on **The Game of Life**.
