1 Prepare for a College Visit

TRANSITION OBJECTIVE

Students will visit a college campus and write a report.

RELEVANCE TO SUCCESSFUL TRANSITION

Post-secondary students will have had limited experience on college campuses. A visit to a local campus will help to allow them to make an informed decision.

INSTRUCTIONAL SEQUENCE

□ STEP 1: Update Journal

Going to college is . . .

□ **STEP 2:** Convene Roundtable

"A good reason to go to college is _____."

□ STEP 3: Advance Organizer

"Today you will prepare to visit a college and write a report."

STEP 4: Activity - Visitation

Students who are considering college entrance as a post-secondary option will need to spend several hours on a college campus. To make the experience realistic, arrange to pair them with a college student who will act as a guide as they complete the following activities: attend a class, visit the library, bookstore, dining areas and academic support office. Contact the office for students with disabilities or the public relations office. If this is not possible, arrange for a small group of students to tour the campus. If students are interested in a particular program, make an appointment with a professor from that department for a question-and-answer session. Without discouraging them, continue to emphasize that this is but one option. Help them see that this option is also available in the future after they have worked for a while.

STEP 5: Activity - Before & After Visit Students complete the Campus Visit Guide before the visit and take it on the tour. After all visits have been completed, students will work independently or in pairs to complete their **College Report**. Discuss their impressions of college life. Compare the similarities and differences between high school and college and seek their opinion about attending college.

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STEP 7: Connecting Activity
