20 Practice Your Interviewing Skills

TRANSITION OBJECTIVE

Students will practice answering interview questions.

RELEVANCE TO SUCCESSFUL TRANSITION

To have an edge over most other interviewees, the job seeker must be very comfortable answering even the most difficult interview questions. To do this takes practice.

INSTRUCTIONAL SEQUENCE

STEP 1: Update Journal

I am confident during a job interview when...

STEP 2: Convene Roundtable

"Practicing for something I want to do well is smart because _____."

□ STEP 3: Advance Organizer

"For the next week, you will practice interviewing."



STEP 4: Activity - One Class Period

For the next week, students will practice answering the 10 most commonly asked interview questions. First, students will practice with a partner, then in triads. Have students review the **Ten Most Common** Interview Questions, Astonishing Answers! and the Interview Critique. Students will use the critique to evaluate nonverbal communication (handshake, eye contact and posture) and verbal communication (keeping to the facts, talking about skills and experience and closing the interview). Each area is evaluated on a three-point scale, then totaled. Explain that practicing is a powerful learning tool, as it will help them remember exactly what to do or not to do in the future.

STEP 5: Activity - Two Class Periods

Students practice with a partner, asking and answering the **Ten Most Common Interview Questions** and using the answers they developed with the handout **Astonishing Answers!** from Lesson 18. Spend at least one class period practicing. Tell students that during this time they need to get comfortable talking about themselves and their strengths.

STEP 6: Activity - Two Class Periods

Students will practice interviewing in triads, alternating the following roles: The Interviewer will ask the **Ten Most Common Interview Questions**; the Interviewee will respond using his/her own **Astonishing Answers!**; the Observer will evaluate the Interviewee on the **Interview Critique**. One section of the **Interview Critique** will be used by each Observer, leaving the Interviewee two sections for self critique. The triad will conduct a total of six mock interviews, giving each student in the group two turns as the Interviewee, as well as two critiques, one from each of the other members. After all triads have completed the six interviews (two in each role), debrief the class by asking students to share a general reaction and one thing they learned from this experience.
