


#### WES TRAIL AWARD SCHEME

The Society's Trail Riding Award Scheme is open only to members of the Society

The Scheme is very simple - any WES member who hacks out for pleasure (training and schooling do NOT count) in a western saddle can record their hours and qualify for an award. The horse does not have to belong to the rider, but must be ridden in a western saddle.

- The scheme is subject to a once only payment of £40.
- Participants can download a log sheet from the WES web site (www.wes-uk.com) on which to record their hours spent hacking. If you do not



- Subject to ratification\* the following awards will be made:
  - **75 hours:** Commemorative certificate.
  - 150 hours: Commemorative certificate.
  - **250 hours:** A certificate plus an inscribed silver belt buckle\* supplied by Montana Silversmiths, subsidised by £50.00 from WES funds, the price to be confirmed at the time of purchase.
  - 500 hours: Certificate plus option to purchase trail award merchandise embroidered with the Trail Award Logo obtainable from WES Merchandising.
  - **1,000 hours:** Option to purchase a Trail Award Jacket, embroidered with the Trail Award Logo, obtainable from WES Merchandising, together with 1 year's free membership of the Society.

\*To qualify for the silver belt buckle and other benefits claimants must have maintained continuous membership of the society since joining the scheme. In the event of membership lapsing for any period the claimant's participation in the Trail Riding Scheme will be deemed void. Rider records must be submitted to the Society on an annual basis when requested. Clothing supplied will vary depending upon the fashion as the time of request.

## Where have all the Cowboys Gone?

Just where is Western Riding going? I've been involved with the sport now for nearly 30 years and to be honest it hasn't really progressed.

Yes, we have more competitors participating at an International level but I'm prepared to bet that the actual number of riders involved in the sport overall isn't much higher that when I became involved all those years ago – and I have to ask why?

WES have over 2000 followers on Facebook yet our membership has fallen to just over 400.

Even at our peak we only ever hit just under 1000 members and never did reach that magic number.

One of the reasons for the fall is cost – many western riders were members of all the Western Associations WES, AQHA, APHAUK, UKPHA and British Reining but as these organisations have become more active, riders have dropped out of some organisations to reduce expense, but that's not the complete answer.

I joined WES back in 1989/90 just after I'd bought my Welsh Cob. If I wanted to do Western I had two options WES or WHA. The WHA was very games orientated and most of the people I was getting to know were WES so it was the WES route we went.

Back in the days when I started fuel was £1.50 a gallon for Diesel and it was cheaper than petrol.

However very little happened by way of events and the whole calendar comprised a handful of dates - a clinic at Solihull then shows at Solihull, Sovereign, The Avenue and that was about it. There was also the American All Breeds which was an independent show and then the Breed show for those with quarter horses but not much else.

Over time this has grown. WES runs over 100 events a year via the Area Reps and then we have The National Clinic at Moreton Morrel and the National show.

In addition we now have far more Quarter Horse Shows, a trend that was started by Brian Carter and the East Coast Circuit and the Reining competitions run by British Reining.

Another reason for the decline is cited as the activities held at the three big venues. Oakridge, Sovereign and Bodiam and the growth of smaller Western Riding Clubs, but to some extent this has been the case in the past.

There has always been pockets of activity based around venues and trainers – Both the Avenue and Wye Oak with Bob, Sovereign with David were areas of high activity. Since huge investments have been made by individuals to provide good quality facilities and these venues are being run as businesses and have to attract riders to survive. This should be good for the sport and make it more accessible – but is it? Numbers may have grown locally but participation in the sport nationally still doesn't seem to be growing and I don't think participation in these events is growing much either. All have included WES classes onto their show bills but have suffered from a lack of entries.

For the past 2 years we've been opening the facilities on our farm to Western riders – regular clinics charged at cost and member's days that were at a nominal fee to boost area funds but the take up has been poor. Area activities all over the country are being cancelled or being run at a loss. We are 120 miles from Oakridge, 150 miles from Sovereign and 230 miles from Bodiam so they shouldn't impact on our area's activities, besides one of the reasons stated in the recent Facebook post for not being a member was the cost of travelling.

So what is happening and why isn't the sport growing?

Access to activities despite what people say is greater than ever before, there are more trainers including the hordes of 'Natural Horsemen'; tack and equipment is readily available via several suppliers and indeed the internet; and the availability of suitable horses is better – although having taken a Welsh Cob from nothing to a high point horse does prove that you can ride western with any breed.

A lot of the riders I started with are still competing 30 years later and they will continue to compete. I've also seen a lot come and go, but I see very few new faces these days and I wonder why?

There has been a lot said about horse owners who don't ride – the new not riding fraternity who groom and pat their pony but never got on – is this a reason?



We've very few younger riders these days and even fewer younger people who are prepared to help. The age group of the organisers and committees/councils of most organisations is ageing.

We live in an age of instant gratification. People want things easy and don't want to put any effort into anything.

Western riding is a difficult discipline to do correctly and no amount of dumbing down classes for walk jog and in hand will change that. The easy come easy go brigade will enter those classes and as soon as they stop getting placed stop coming because it's too hard to progress to the 'proper' classes.

There's also in added issue of all the armchair experts on social media who know everything without the experience of anything and who post comments without any thought because they are too lazy or ignorant of the issues they are commenting on. It's easy to criticise but it's not so easy to actually do something constructive.

Without new blood and support organisations and certainly WES will wither and eventually die. That would be a tragedy as most people who ride western in the UK started with WES and have subsequently moved on. Without the grass roots the knock effect will be that the other organisations will also suffer as there'll be no progression.

This trend does not appear to be the sole problem of western either.

At one time our local riding clubs were balloting out competitors due to over subscription of events, now events are being cancelled through lack of support.

Attendance at other breed shows has also fallen – The Northern Appaloosa show was very poorly attended and I'm advised that even the Arab regional shows are struggling.

So where do we go? While there is still a hard core of interested members we'll continue to organise our sport as best we can because we enjoy what we do and the thanks we get after running an event from the people who actually support it makes it all worthwhile.

This year's National Show, although poorly supported, was a success and those who attended really had a good week-end. The next Moreton Morell Clinic is already fully booked with a waiting list, so interest is still there.

You only get out of any organisation what you put in. WES exists to promote Western Riding so get involved.

This year's AGM is on 17<sup>th</sup> March at 2 pm. Come along and have your say.

### Thoughts on Encouraging Earlier Entries for Shows

My thoughts on encouraging earlier entries for shows below.

As everyone who has ever organised a show knows, it's scary waiting for entries. You've found the venue, the date, the judge, the patterns, got approval and committed the money. Fingers crossed nothing unforeseen happens, no bad weather and enough volunteers come along to make everything run smoothly. Let the sleepless nights begin!

At this point I have to say we are incredibly lucky in area 5. We are rarely short of volunteers and often have the same folks in the same role show after show. The headache of getting the right number of rosettes on time is taken care of by Lynne Steel, something I am extremely grateful for. So a big thank you from me to all our very able volunteers

Understandably, competitors don't like to commit too early. Horses can go lame, life can get in the way and fees are non-returnable without an appropriate vet or doctor's certificate.

To try to alleviate the possible financial risk, we will refund any fees up to and including the closing date for entries with no questions asked. After that date, we use our judgement.

We also ask that competitors enter all the classes they are likely to do but send payment for just one class with entry. Entries are easier to scrub than to add. We also ask that they keep their competition number for each show. Payment is accepted by cash, cheque or online. Competitors have enough to worry about so entry forms have all the classes listed so competitors just have to tick off the ones they want.



Entry forms, disclaimers and patterns are all sent out as soon as we can preferably by email. We try to accept entries in almost any form if it means another competitor.

We still have late entries but there is a surcharge for entries after the closing date. It's not perfect and never will be but we do seem to be getting entries in better.

## Should WES Newsletter be restricted to WES members?

We allow non-members to attend our events, except shows. We allow them access to our Facebook pages and all the information there.

Apart from shows and meetings what does WES offer specifically for members? Not a lot.

#### Editor's Note:

The Distribution of WES News is primarily to WES Members, as it is an "opt in" distribution list that developed by members asking to be on it, either directly or via their Area Reps. Similarly, to download it from the website you have to sign in. Although there is no control on the subsequent re-distribution of the PDF copies by members, this is not currently seen as a problem, as it could help encourage people to join WES. Maybe this could be discussed at the AGM.

### **WES Job Descriptions**

Editor's Note: The following article appeared in WES news dated June 2013. As several WES positions may be coming vacant in 2019, or have been filled by new volunteers, it seemed appropriate to repeat it here. I have corrected one or two typos and tried to make the formatting consistent, other than that is is as it appeared. I think that the descriptions may well need updating so this could be a discussion point for the AGM

#### **Volunteers Working For You**

#### The role of the management council is: Overall to

- lead
- direct
- ensure

#### Vision and leadership

Develop/ approve long-term strategic plans and monitors progress in implementing the strategic plan.

#### Accountability and legal liability

Monitor the activities of the organisation and ensure that activities support the organisation's overall purpose/ aims.

#### **Keeping it legal**

Ensure compliance with all relevant legal and regulatory requirements.

#### **Financial management**

Ensure adequate financial resources are sought/secured; ensure money and property is properly managed, prepare funding applications as agreed with Management Committee.

#### Managing staff and volunteers

Ensure appropriate organisational policies and procedures are in place

Basically, the role of the Management Council in broad terms, is to lead, direct, and ensure the organisation operates effectively

#### The officers

#### Chairman:

The chairman's overall responsibility is to lead the council and the Society to enable it to fulfil its purpose and to act as both spokesperson and



figurehead as appropriate as well as ensuring there is an effective relationship between the council, membership and other officers of the Society

The role can be varied and will depend on the amount of time the volunteer has to devote to the activities, however, as an overview the role includes:

- Plan and prepare council meetings and the AGM with others as appropriate.
- To ensure the Society meets the objectives of the Constitution and abides by the Rulebook
- Chair committee meetings, ensuring:
  - o A balance is struck between timekeeping and space for discussions.
  - o Business is dealt with and decisions made.
  - o Decisions, actions and deliberations are adequately minuted.
  - o The implementation of decisions is clearly assigned and monitored
  - Liaise with both Judges' and instructors'
     Committee Chairs as appropriate.
- Ensure adequate support and supervision arrangements are made for any volunteers directly managed or reporting to the council.

#### **Society Secretary:**

The secretary is the first point of contact for enquiries to the Society and also manages the processes that ensure the council complies with the Society Constitution and is responsible for organising the annual general meeting and council meetings, taking minutes and ensuring all information is circulated to relevant parties.

The role can be varied and will depend on the amount of time the volunteer has to devote to the activities, however, as an overview the role includes:

- Organising, preparing agendas for and taking minutes of council meetings and annual general meetings.
- Dealing with correspondence, collating information and writing reports, ensuring decisions made are communicated to the relevant officers.

- Contributing to meeting discussions as and when required.
- Developing and overseeing the systems that ensure the Society complies with all applicable codes, in addition to its legal and statutory requirements.

#### **Treasurer:**

The treasurer oversees the financial affairs of the Society and ensures they are legal, constitutional and within accepted accounting practice, ensures proper records are kept and that effective financial procedures are in place.

- Monitor and report on the financial health of the Society.
- Oversee the production of necessary financial reports/ returns, accounts and audits.
- Liaise with relevant council members and/or volunteers to ensure the financial viability of the organisation.
- Make fellow council members aware of their financial obligations and take a lead in interpreting financial data to them.
- Regularly report the financial position at council meetings
- Oversee the production of an annual budget and propose its adoption at the last meeting of the previous financial year.
- Ensure proper records are kept and that effective financial procedures and controls are in place, i.e.:
  - o Cheque signatories
  - o Expense payments
  - o Others as appropriate
- Appraising the financial viability of plans, proposals and feasibility studies for society activities.
- Lead on appointing and liaising with auditors or an independent examiner.

#### **Membership Secretary**:

The Membership Secretary's duties are:

- Maintaining the membership database.
- Enter details of new members.
- Update membership details upon payment of annual fees, or when advised of change of address, etc.
- Provide current membership figures to each council meeting.



- Advise council meeting of those members who have not renewed their membership, particularly those holding positions of instructors and Judges.
- Prepare and print off renewal and overdue letters.
- Immediately prior to the quarterly magazine prepare and print off address labels for WES News.
- Prepare membership cards for new members and those renewing their membership.
- Prepare and circulate monthly membership lists for council and Area Reps.
- Retain the computer used for the membership database.

#### **Area Coordinator:**

The Area Coordinators duties are to:

- Maintain an up to date record of:
  - o Area Representatives, including contact details and term of office.
  - o County Representatives, including contact details and Term of Office.
  - o Area bank account signatories.
  - o WES banners held by Areas.
- Organise election/re-appointment of Area Representatives in accordance with the Constitution
- Develop and maintain written guidance for Area Representatives that is fully consistent with the Constitution and, where appropriate, provide induction training for incoming Area Representatives.
- Act as liaison between Council and Area Representatives, and specifically with the Society's Treasurer regarding receipt of Annual Accounts from each Area.
- Act as the first point of contact for Area Representatives and provide advice and support as and when required.
- Take a leading role in arranging the annual Area Representative's meeting.
- Attend and provide reports to council meetings (at least 3 a year).
- Attend and provide an end of year report to the Annual General Meeting.

#### **Show Coordinator:**

The Show Coordinator records all activities organised by the Society – council and Area

Representatives to ensure the requirements of the Society insurance are covered, in particular:-

- To approve all applications in respect of Approved, Affiliated or Appendix shows and clinics.
- To administer the subsidised Judge scheme.
- To maintain the points database of all horses and riders.
- To receive results from all Approved, Affiliated or Appendix shows and enter the results onto the points database.
- To administer the year end awards including retrieving previously awarded trophies.

#### **Health & Safety Officer:**

The health and safety officer offers expert knowledge and skills in order to generate and promote a positive health and safety culture. This represents a key role in helping to control occupational risk.

- Make changes to the Society and Policies practices that are safe and comply with legislation.
- Prepare health and safety strategies and developing Society policy.
- Carry out risk assessments and consider how risks could be reduced.
- Outline safe operational procedures which identify and take account of all relevant hazards.
- Assist in in-house training with show managers about health and safety issues and risks.
- Keep records of incidents and accidents and produce statistics for council.
- Keep up to date with new legislation and maintain a working knowledge of all Health and Safety Executive (HSE) legislation and any developments that affect the Society.

#### **Press and Public Relations Officer:**

Press and Public relations is about managing reputation. To promote the Society in all areas of the media and to liaise with Area Representatives in respect of publishing their activities. To manage an advertising budget and seek editorial content within publications in association with advertising.

The role can be varied and will depend on the amount of time the volunteer has to devote to the activities, however, as an overview the role includes:



- planning, developing and implementing a PR strategy for the Society;
- liaising with both council and Area Reps;
- liaising with and answering enquiries from media, individuals and other organisations, often via telephone and email;
- researching, writing and distributing press releases to targeted media;
- collating and analysing media coverage;
- preparing and supervising the production of publicity brochures:
- devising and coordinating photo opportunities;
- organising events including press conferences, exhibitions, open days and press tours;
- Liaising with the webmaster in maintaining and updating information on the Society's website;
- sourcing and managing speaking and sponsorship opportunities;
- managing the PR aspect of a potential crisis situation.

#### Youth Officer:

The Youth Officer's duties are to promote both the membership of Youth within the Society and to organise Youth activities for Society members

- To promote and increase the number of Youth riders within the Society.
- To organise clinics specifically for youth riders within the Society.
- To liaise with other organisations to the benefit of Youth riders within the Society.
- To manage and account for the Youth budget.

#### **Non-voting Members of Council**

#### **WES News Editor:**

The responsibility of the editor is to source items of interest to members in keeping with the original ideals of the Society.

- Encourage WES instructors to send in training articles for publication.
- Gain permission from other publications in order to reproduce articles which have a copyright.
- Actively search for new advertisers in order to offset production costs.

- Encourage all members to submit interesting articles for publication.
- Publish information provided by council including a precis of meetings.

#### Merchandise:

- To maintain a stock of merchandise for the Society.
- To advise on sales.
- To recommend new lines where appropriate.
- To be accountable for the WES Merchandise.

#### Webmaster:

- Maintain a website that provides useful information for both current and potential members
- Ensure website is updated regularly, particularly the Events Calendar and Contact details
- Check classified advert listings regularly (at least twice a week) to authorise newly input free adverts for members only
- Answer or forward enquiries received via the website
- Arrange monthly payment of WESH Hosting fee
- Monitor usage and bandwidth stats to ensure website is running as economically as possible
- Promote advertising spaces and liaise with current and potential advertisers

#### **Trail Award Administrator**

- To administer the trail award scheme on behalf of council.
- To provide reports both to council and WES News in respect of awards being achieved by members entered on the scheme.
- To promote the scheme both within the Society and elsewhere.

#### Judges' & Instructors' Committee Secretary

The role includes:

- Organising, preparing agendas for and taking minutes of meetings;
- Deal with correspondence, collating information and writing reports, ensuring decisions made are communicated to the relevant officers:



- Contributing to meeting discussions as and when required
- Developing and overseeing the systems that ensure the Society complies with all applicable codes, in addition to its legal and statutory requirements.
- Maintain the Judge and Instructor databases.
- Enter details of new Judges and Instructors members.
- Provide a list current Judges and Instructors to council meetings.

#### Welfare Officer:

The overall aim of the Welfare Adviser role is to provide assurance to members, via council, that the Society's Statement of Position on Animal Welfare is adhered to. Key activities to be undertaken are as follows:

- Develop and maintain the Council's Policy and Procedures relating to animal welfare, specifically to clarify respective roles, responsibilities and methods of reporting and feedback.
- Raise stakeholders' awareness and understanding on issues of animal welfare, and educate them regarding their role and responsibilities as responsible members of the Society.
- Provide a point of contact for all matters relating to animal welfare issues arising from the council's statement.
- Maintain a central record of incidents reported and make recommendations to Council regarding appropriate action to be taken in all cases.
- Liaise with other equestrian organisations and represent the Society on all matters of animal welfare.
- Attend council meetings if required.
- Deliver an annual report to members, via council.

#### Other Officers Chair of Judges

- Plan and prepare Judges' meetings.
- Ensure the Society meets the objectives of the Constitution and abides by the Rulebook
- Liaise with the Society Chairman in respect of recommendations.
- Chair committee meetings ensuring:

- o A balance is struck between timekeeping and space for discussions.
- o Business is dealt with and decisions made.
- o Decisions, actions, and deliberations are adequately minuted.
- The implementation of decisions is clearly assigned and monitored.

#### Chair of instructors

- Plan and prepare instructors' meetings.
- Ensure the Society meets the objectives of the Constitution and abides by the Rulebook
- Liaise with the Society Chairman in respect of recommendations.
- Chair committee meetings ensuring:
  - o A balance is struck between timekeeping and space for discussions.
  - o Business is dealt with and decisions made.
  - o Decisions, actions and deliberations are adequately minuted.
  - o The implementation of decisions is clearly assigned and monitored.

#### Area representatives:

An area representative should be elected by the membership of the area for a maximum period of two years after which they shall stand down and may offer themselves for re-election. The area representative will be sent an up-to-date members list for their area each month from the membership secretary. This will help the representative welcome new members, identify any non-renewing members, and facilitate a mailing list to mail a regular newsletter for the area membership.

They are responsible in each area for: Promoting the Society

- Organising and coordinating activities for members
- Acting as a liaison between the area membership and the Council
- Enforcing the Society's health and safety policy
- Overseeing the area funds or liaising with the area treasurer where there is one appointed.

Representatives must organise an area AGM where voting in new representatives for the end



of term positions, i.e. treasurer, county reps. or area reps. can be performed along with discussing the year's activities.

The accounts for the area should be presented to the members at the area AGM and then published in the area newsletter and a copy sent to the Society's Treasurer.

The names of the Area account signatories must be given to the Area Co-ordinator.

Although not mandatory, the Area Representative is encouraged to form a sub-committee from the members in their area to help with the accounts and organising events etc.

Area shows must be run in accordance with the handbook from the Show Management Seminar.

Area clinics should be run in accordance with the guidelines in the Society handbook from the Show Management Seminar. Again, anyone organising a clinic should notify the area representative, to the Show Co-ordinator, for approval. Once obtained it can then be publicised on the Society website, magazine and in the area newsletter, and the organisers covered by the Society's insurance.

#### **County Representatives:**

County representatives should be elected for a maximum period of two years by members residing in the same county, after which period they shall stand down but may offer themselves for re-election.

Indeed if you pick up any book on Western riding the basics all seem to be what we teach and are taught and

indeed at every lesson (whether taking it or riding in it) we have to resort back to!!

How often do we end up refining direct or indirect bend, backups moving the hips or moving the shoulders before doing anything else more jazzy!

However..... Remember that what we as western riders do is considered quite advanced by English riders so be proud.

As I have said in previous articles sometimes you need to assess where you are (in life as well as in your training) and decide on your way forward.

My much loved Highland mare has voted with her feet and I have decided that she has gone as high as I can physically (for her) take her.

Yes she can do what I am asking but not with the enthusiasm she should have for the job in hand. Sooo I am starting all over again and the next articles will include musings about my 5 year old just coming into competition and my two youngsters a two year old Highland and a yearling I do not yet have!! As Well as my little 6 year old Coblet. Something for everyone!!

What I find interesting is the different breeds and body types and what some find easy others find hard especially at different ages and stages.

Today we will look at Flora my two year old Highland and Sioux my 5 year old Appaloosa x Dales.

#### Flora's tale to date!.....

I bought Flora as an unseen yearling! (I do not advise this but I know we all do it!!) I fell in love with her photo..... No laughing please! I mean how could I resist this.....





Since she has been with me we have had a good few ups and downs. Literally and metaphorically!

Anyone who has ridden or worked with Highland ponies will know how strong they can be and how opinionated they can also be.

Yes they are fabulous ponies but jiminy peeps!! First step I thought I would teach her to lead, stop and back up. Simple! Erm no not in the programme. She had no respect for space, if you moved her out of your space she would take offence and swing her hips (and legs around) if you led her she would straighten her neck and depart the vicinity rather quickly. She then decided a good game was not being caught at all nor allow you to put the head collar on.

Now those who know me know I have had a few highlands as well as bred them. However this was not my foal that I bred so I had to start right at the beginning. I have really had to prove myself to her and her to me. Last summer I worked on clicker training (Highlands's loooove food) I used a cone clicked when she touched it and treated her.

When I said I could not head collar her I meant go anywhere near her with one and she was off! So I had to work on touching her with the head collar, working up to touching her nose and then getting her to drop her nose into the head collar taking each step bit by bit an only ensuring that I only rewarded the positive and stopped before it went wrong.

By week three I was able to get her to drop her nose in and fasten it over her head.

If I tried to touch her with the rope anywhere that was enough for her to run.

She is strong!

I have no access to an arena or a roundpen that would mean loading her to travel and I felt that to do that would push her too far and she would lose faith in me.

I felt that it was important to take it step by step.

Bit by bit in rain and wind we worked away 5 or ten minutes a night.

The huge achievement was leading her out for a walk around two miles round the estate with my dog and we came back alive!!



Over the winter she stayed with the herd but this summer we had a bit of a breakthrough. I am not in favour of working Native youngsters too hard they need time to grow and think! But as she had chased a dog she was in a separate field my other mare went in with her alongside a friends two Arabs.

I was doing rope work and circling with my older mare. Flora stood and watched the Arabs decided it was a bit scary. Flora seemed to realise the rope was not going to hurt her as it had not hurt her friend.

Strange? Unexplained?

I do not know and do not purport to know what they think but for a horse that would not let me near her back or sides with a rope we have taken a leap forward and she accepts the rope over her back, hocks and under her belly. This filly was spooky!

Last month we have now been able to work on bitting and letting her feel the bit in with a little lateral feel and have the saddle pad on and off. I have managed to teach her to think about the mount block and standing beside it and putting my leg over her back. Such a huge step forward but mentally she has been ready to accept it.







#### Sioux:

Sioux is my home bred filly who is now five. Last year I sent her away to get some more work on her after she was backed by myself but when she came back she had grown again and was a bit uneven so I turned her away over the winter.

This year I brought her back into work and took her to Western Week at Ardfern Argyll. So the two of us could gel a bit more it also meant that I was riding every day for 7 days and four hours a day!

Patience and perseverance paid off and we played with sacks dragging them along the ground as well as the Garroche pole and we competed in the end of week show which was a very proud moment.

#### However, to conclude:

We need to remember that they are horses and not machines and sometimes in a young horses training we need to back off a bit. as I had to do with Flora and perhaps just because they are doing well in the show pen like Sioux it does not make them big brave horses out hacking! As I found out when we went past the wind sock the other day I could feel her becoming more and more anxious about it so I decided rather than her cope with me worrying about the wind sock also I would get off let her process and then walk on a bit stand her at a suitable place and get back on again which is what we did.

There is nothing wrong in going back in your training to fill a hole and then move forward again.

It becomes a win win for both of us. Never be afraid to go with your gut instinct there are times you can push through a problem but if you feel something is not going to end well go back to something that is easier and your horse and you can succeed at before trying again build your confidence and that of your horse in steps rather that the two of you overface each other.

Do not be afraid to stand your ground with others if you feel you or your horse are getting close to "losing" it! Take a breath finish on a good note and try again tomorrow.





And they say we are only hacking! Lol. Really pushing her out her comfort zone.

Hopefully by the next time I write I will have Flora long reining and Sioux out hacking more confidently! Happy trails no matter how you do them.

### From Race Horse to Western Horse

The RoR (Retraining of Racehorses) hosted the first Showcase of its kind at Aintree International Arena, Aintree Racecourse. The day consisted of displays and demonstrations from a range of professionals with their ex racehorses.

I was asked if I would demonstrate Western Riding on my ex racehorse Midnight Robbery.

Midnight is a 5year old gelding, he came out of racing in June 2017 when he came to me, from Bryan Smart Racing. He started his western training shortly after and took to it like a duck to water.

When he first arrived he was a little stiff and as expected was very good at going in a straight line, the idea of bending and moving off my leg was a little alien to him.

But with time and patience and slowly working and creating more bend and flexibility, he started to look more and more like a western horse.

We introduced him to trail obstacles which he seemed to really enjoy, using his brain to work a problem out himself and proving to be very careful over poles, but brave and trusting over a variety of obstacles.

He competed in his first wes Show in September 2017 and then again this season.

When asked to display at the showcase I was actually 5 months pregnant, so was a little concerned at the timing as it would be just over a month after my due date! But a true testiment to Midnights nature, I continued to ride throughout, even if it was fairly sedate!

Baby arrived in October and after a two week break I was back in the saddle and preparing to show off western to the best of my ability.

We arrived at Aintree on Friday afternoon, allowing plenty of time to have a ride in the arena. The atmosphere of the racecourse brought back memories for Midnight and he was a little excited walking down to the arena, but after 5 minutes of our usual warm up routine he was back to normal. I must say we did get some lovely comments from some of the fellow riders also warming up, especially on the length of my reins!

Saturday morning came round very quickly and the showcase got underway, meanwhile in the stable yard I was midway through banding Midnights mane and putting the final sparkle and shine to him.

Our demo was at 2.20 and as I made my way down to the arena, down the horse walk and underneath the grandstands, the butterflies were fluttering in my stomach.

He warmed up like a dream and we walked between the stands and into the centre of the arena. We seemed very small in that big arena but after a slight hitch with the microphone he began to dazzle the crowds with his suppleness and effortless performance of all the western gaits. We then showed a selection of western trail obstacles and demonstrated the manoeuvrability and trust required during these disciplines. The 40 minute demo flew by and I couldn't fault Midnights performance.

We then made way for our question and answer session, however we didn't make it all the way to the



designated spot as were inundated with questions and compliments as we left the arena. Some excellent questions and genuine amazement at the quiet and relaxed natures of the horse and the responsiveness and willingness of the demonstration changed a few minds about Western riding.

I thoroughly enjoyed the whole experience and hope to be asked to attend next year.

But for now there are lots of plans in the pipeline to get more horses and riders taking part in western riding, especially ex racehorses with the help and support of RoR.


Hello Area 3,


