Key to qualifications: **R**, Riding Stables. WES levels: **1**, Assumed to be an Assistant Instructor, working under the direct or indirect supervision of a more highly qualified instructor/trainer. A Level 1 instructor is expected to be able to teach basic Western riding skills to novice riders on trained horses on a one-to-one basis e.g. In a riding school situation; **2**, Expected to have good theoretical and practical knowledge of all disciplines covered by WES and to be able to prepare students and horses for competition in all WES show classes at local/novice rider level. Should be capable of teaching independently in one-to-one or group sessions. Should be a competent horse person, capable of working with both trained and novice horses; **3**, An experienced instructor, who has demonstrated a high degree of practical ability, and depth of theoretical knowledge in at least 2 specialist modules. The instructor will be of a satisfactory standard in order to prepare horses and riders at National Championship level; **4**, An autonomous and highly experienced instructor, who has demonstrated a high degree of practical ability, and a depth of theoretical knowledge in at least 5 specialist modules; **5**, Honorary. An enhanced level, which may be awarded to those level 4 instructors who have demonstrated a commitment to continuous professional development and equestrian excellence.

WES Policy on UKCC Instructors wishing to apply for WES

- 1. To become a WES approved instructora UKCC coach must:
 - a. Become a member of the Western Equestrian Society.
 - b. Pay an application fee for the assessment.
 - c. Have undertaken and passed a Western Equestrian Society Rulebook Test
- 3. Upon application the Instructor will be required to comply with all rules of the Western Equestrian Society relating to membership of the Approved list including maintaining Society membership, attendance on an approved Child Protection Course and providing proof of insurance and First Aid on an annual basis.

Q24 International Championship

Aachen, Germany 3rd to 12th October 2024

FOUR UK competitors made their way to Q24 this year and had one of the most successful shows for UK competitors in recent times across a wide range of disciplines and classes.



Travelling were Alan Payne with his mother's Hot Steppin Leaguer, it is worth noting that Alan had bred and trained 'Beau' (Hot Steppin Leaguer) and had also competed Beau's Dam and Sire. Carin Herrick with her own Wimpys Smart Chex (Twinkie), Lucy Adams with Sheeza Tinsel Lady, her senior horse and Onlystopninforicecream her junior horse, and Annie Gravett with Code Word Lazy.

The competition was tough which was to be expected with Annie competing in the biggest class of the show Level 1 Amateur Trail with 39 entries.

All the horse and rider combinations were placed top 5 or above and all made the finals in their classes. At Q all riders initially compete in 4 AQHA classes and then the results are combined, and the top qualifying horses go through to the finals, where the entries are large the top 15 riders go through, but this number reduces in line with the initial entries. It is therefore a massive achievement to make the finals and what all competitors strive to achieve.

The final medal haul was impressive with Carin Herrick and Wimpys Smart Chex winning 2 Gold Medals and International Championships in Amateur Select Ranch Riding and Open Ranch Trail. 3 Silver Medals and Reserve International Championships in Amateur Working Western Rail, Open

Working Western Rail and Amateur Select Western Horsemanship and finally Reserve Champion Amateur Ranch Challenge.

Points are also accumulated across all the classes that the competitors compete in and the overall combination with the highest points in each division are awarded an All-Around Championship. As well as the ridden performance classes to qualify the horses must also compete in the halter classes. Carrin and Twinkie won 3 of the 4 All Around Amateur Select Championship Awards

Alan on his first trip to Aachen with Beau had a very successful show competing in some very tough classes and scoring 70 plus for wins and top six placings in Trail, Western Riding and Western Pleasure. Alan and Beau were Reserve L1 Western Riding Circuit Champion and took home the Bronze Medal in the blue ribbon event Senior Western Pleasure and were also placed 6th in the Senior Trail Final

Alan showed Annie Gravett's mare in the Open Performance Halter Class and were placed 5th overall with the combined results of the 4 judges. Annie then competed in the Amateur Select Trail and placed 8th in the finals after qualifying from the 4 x AQHA classes.

Lucy Adams is going from strength to strength competing in Europe and had another impressive show with her stunning palomino Sheeza Tinsel Lady 'Greta' winning the Level 1 Green Ranch Riding Circuit Champion and also the Bronze medal in the Senior Ranch Riding Championship.

Lucy was also competing her new horse Onlystopnforicecream (Great Name) 'Icy' at her first ever show and they placed 2nd x 5th in the Level 1 Green Ranch Riding but went on to win the Bronze Medal in the Junior Ranch Riding Championship

The show was very long, 10 days of actual showing and a couple of days for warm ups to get the horses acclimatised to the venue. The weather was not kind with plenty of rain but fortunately the indoor arena was used when it was too wet to show in the massive outdoor dressage arena. All the competitors, horses, owners, helpers, and dogs must have been exhausted by the time they got home; these events are a team effort and AQHA UK would like to offer huge Congratulations to all.

More Than a Hobby – A Way of Life

WHEN I first said, "I want to learn to ride a horse," I had no idea what was about to unfold. I thought I was buying a hobby – something new, something personal. What I got instead was a life, a family, a truckload of new friends, and a heart that's never been so full

My journey into the western world started, as many do, with a single horse – George. Some of you know him already, and if you do, then you'll know exactly what I



mean when I say he has personality. But for me, George is much more than just a horse with character. He's the one who taught me what it means to truly ride, to listen, to earn a horse's trust – and to keep getting back on (even if it's after a fly buck and a bruised ego).

This year, George and I are on an adventure. From March to September, we're on the road most weekends – clinics, camps, shows – learning every step of the way. My aim? Simple: to become the rider he deserves.



But I'm no longer riding solo. My wife, once a die-hard eventer, is now fully converted to western. She's riding a beautiful four-year-old who's just starting out in the world, and together they'll be joining us at camps and clinics this year. She's also taken on the role of Area 8 Co-ordinator, so her weekends are just as horse-filled as mine – and she wouldn't have it any other way.

Our daughter Mollie is a regular at youth camps with her Welsh Section B, but if she had her way, she'd already have her very own (older) Quarter Horse. Watching her ride and grow in confidence is one of the real joys of this journey. And not to be left out, our youngest – Harry, age five – rides in

charity pleasure classes on a Shetland, kitted out in full western tack, naturally. We're not just a family that rides anymore. We're a western family – full stop.

We've shaped our lives around this way of being. I built our lorry so we can live off-grid for days – even weeks – at a time. That setup lets us strip everything back to what really matters: our horses, each other, and the community we've found along the way.



Because beyond the riding, beyond the shows, beyond the buckles and boots – the real magic of western isn't in the saddle. It's in the people. We've made friends we'll keep for life. There's a little show family that we see at almost every event. The ones who cheer for you, laugh with you, help you tack up when you're late, and hand you a drink when the day's done. That's where the gold is.

I've been lucky enough to work with and be guided by incredible horsemen and women – Tanya Rowe, David Deptford, Lee Rutter, Bob Mayhew – and honestly, every single person I've trained with has left their mark on me. I've learned something from each of them. Sometimes it was a big technical thing. Sometimes, just a small shift in mindset. But all of it matters.

We are, as we like to say, Team Gwalter. And I couldn't be prouder to be on this journey with my tribe – two-legged and four.

So yes, this started as a wish to ride a horse. But now, I live differently. I look forward differently. I measure success differently. This isn't just a hobby anymore.

This is a way of life.



WES Youth Clinic


