


WES TRAIL AWARD SCHEME

The Society's Trail Riding Award Scheme is open only to members of the Society

The Scheme is very simple - any WES member who hacks out for pleasure (training and schooling do NOT count) in a western saddle can record their hours and qualify for an award. The horse does not have to belong to the rider, but must be ridden in a western saddle.

- The scheme is subject to a once only payment of £40.
- Participants can download a log sheet from the WES web site (www.wes-uk.com) on which to record their hours spent hacking. If you do not



- Subject to ratification* the following awards will be made:
 - **75 hours:** Commemorative certificate.
 - 150 hours: Commemorative certificate.
 - **250 hours:** A certificate plus an inscribed silver belt buckle* supplied by Montana Silversmiths, subsidised by £50.00 from WES funds, the price to be confirmed at the time of purchase.
 - 500 hours: Certificate plus option to purchase trail award merchandise embroidered with the Trail Award Logo obtainable from WES Merchandising.
 - 1,000 hours: Option to purchase a Trail Award Jacket, embroidered with the Trail Award Logo, obtainable from WES Merchandising, together with 1 year's free membership of the Society.

*To qualify for the silver belt buckle and other benefits claimants must have maintained continuous membership of the society since joining the scheme. In the event of membership lapsing for any period the claimant's participation in the Trail Riding Scheme will be deemed void. Rider records must be submitted to the Society on an annual basis when requested. Clothing supplied will vary depending upon the fashion as the time of request.

Retiring Chairman's Valedictory Comments

I've been involved in WES since around 1988. I wasn't one of the original group but joined after acquiring my Welsh Cob Tab. Shortly after joining I became Rep for Area 2 and at that time that meant you were on WES Council – and I was asked to be WES Secretary. Bill Sheppard was chair and Bill brought in the changes that formed the structure we have today.

Previously Council was the Area Reps – each were then allocated a job. It was a system that became untenable as most Reps wanted to concentrate on running their Areas. Council meeting often didn't have a quorum and the status quo could not continue.

Bill brought in the new structure where Council became separate and in fact became a management team with members being voted to take a specific post leaving the Area Reps free to run their areas.

I stepped down from Council for a while but then re-joined as Press and Publicity until 2007 when I took on the role of Chairman.

Since that time, I've tried to ensure that the Society has been run in as fair and open way as possible. Before then rules for Judges and Instructors were not written down and seemed to change frequently so the first task were clear and concise rules for both so there was no ambiguity.

We have also had to content with increasing legal pressures such as Discrimination, Child Protection and the dreaded Health & Safety. We've done this in a manner as to not be too onerous but meet the requirements to protect the Society and the membership and meet the requirements of our insurer. Some think we have taken it too far and anything should go but I feel we've the right balance bearing in mind the diversity of the membership the locations and the number of events the Society runs.

The big change since by Chairmanship has been the growth in Social Media. Now everyone has



an opinion and often statements are often made with no knowledge or forethought by people who lack understanding of the subject. It's also surprising how many comments we get about changing rules to reflect an individual's circumstances.

My term is ending after 11 years — not the longest — David Lloyd did 13 years which does question as to whether there should be fixed terms for officers — but then most of the Council have served long periods so without potential replacements that won't work. It is however time for new blood. My circumstances have changed so I can't devote the time needed to the role which I why I'm stepping down.

In the 11 years of service there have been lots of individuals who have helped and supported the Society. There are too many to name, most are still on Council, but some who are not deserve a mention including Ursula Holiday who was Secretary and Show Secretary in the initial period of my term, and also people like Margaret Kemp who has been involved in the Society forever.

There have been some huge highs – The Pink Pleasure probably the best and these offset the lows which included the loss of my two horses. I have no regrets and can honestly say it's been a pleasure to serve.

Job Descriptions for Vacant Posts Chairman

The chairman's overall responsibility is to lead the society council and the Society to enable it to fulfil its purpose and to act as both spokesperson and figurehead as appropriate as well as there is an effective relationship between the Council and both membership and other officers of the Society

The role can be very varied and will depend on the amount of time the volunteer has to devote to the activities however as an overview the role includes:

- Plan and prepare the council meetings and the AGM with others as appropriate.
- To ensure the Society meets the objectives of the Constitution and abides by the rulebook
- Chair committee meetings ensuring:
 - o A balance is struck between time-keeping and space for discussions.
 - o Business is dealt with and decisions made.
 - o Decisions, actions and deliberations are adequately minuted.
 - The implementation of decisions is clearly assigned and monitored.
 - Liaise with both Judges and Instructors Committee Chairs as appropriate.
- Ensure adequate support and supervision arrangements are made for any volunteers directly managed or reporting to the council

Society Secretary

The secretary manages the processes that ensure the Council complies with the Society Constitution and is responsible for organising the annual general meeting and council meetings taking minutes and ensuring all information is circulated to relevant parties.

The role can be very varied and will depend on the amount of time the volunteer has to devote to the activities however as an overview the role includes:

- organising, preparing agendas for and taking minutes of council meetings and annual general meetings (AGMs);
- dealing with correspondence, collating information and writing reports, ensuring decisions made are communicated to the relevant officers;
- contributing to meeting discussions as and when required

 developing and overseeing the systems that ensure the Society complies with all applicable rules, in addition to its legal and statutory requirements.

Area Coordinator

- Maintain an up to date record of:
 - o Area Representatives, including contact details and Term of Office
 - o County Representatives, including contact details and Term of Office
 - Area bank account signatories
 - o WES banners held by Areas
- Organise election/re-appointment of Area Representatives in accordance with the Constitution
- Develop and maintain written guidance for Area Representatives that is fully consistent with the Constitution and, where appropriate, provide induction training for incoming Area Representatives
- Act as liaison between Council and Area Representatives, and specifically with the Society's Treasurer regarding receipt of Annual Accounts from each Area
- Act as the first point of contact for Area Representatives and provide advice and support as and when required
- Take a lead role in arranging the annual Area Representative's meeting
- Attend and provide reports to Council meetings (at least 3 a year)
- Attend and provide an end of year report to the WES Annual AGM

Judges & Instructors Committee Secretary

- organising, preparing agendas for and taking minutes of meetings
- dealing with correspondence, collating information and writing reports, ensuring decisions made are communicated to the relevant officers;
- contributing to meeting discussions as and when required
- developing and overseeing the systems that ensure the Society complies with all applicable codes, in addition to its legal and statutory requirements.
- Maintain the Judges and Instructors database..
- Enter details of new Judges and Instructors members.
- Provide current Judges and Instructors to each Council Meeting.



Webmaster

- Maintain a website that provides useful information for both current and potential members
- Ensure website is updated regularly, particularly the Events Calendar and Contact details
- Answer or forward enquiries received via the website
- Liaise with current Web providers Function 28 in respect of improvements and other requirements
- Maintain the mailings lists in accordance with GDPR
- Promote advertising spaces and liaise with current and potential advertisers
- Maintain and monitor Facebook pages

Welfare Officer

The overall aim of the Welfare Adviser role is to provide assurance to members, via council, that the Society's Statement of Position on Animal Welfare is adhered to. Key activities to be undertaken are as follows:

- Develop and maintain the Council's Policy and Procedures relating to animal welfare, specifically to clarify respective roles, responsibilities and methods of reporting and feedback.
- Raise stakeholders' awareness and understanding on issues of animal welfare, and educate them regarding their role and responsibilities as responsible members of the Society.
- Provide a point of contact for all matters relating to animal welfare issues arising from the council's statement.
- Maintain a central record of incidents reported and make recommendations to Council regarding appropriate action to be taken in all cases.
- Liaise with other equestrian organisations, and represent the Society on all matters of animal welfare.
- Attend council meetings if required.
- Deliver an annual report to members, via council.

WES Statement on Equine Influenza

In light of the current situation with Equine Influenza and requests from Area Reps and Members for guidance. The Society has taken veterinary advice and referred to guidelines published by the BEF.

The Society's current position is that it is not necessary to cancel any of our WES events at this time, but we need to be sensible and vigilant. WES will therefore require all horses attending WES approved events to provide evidence that all flu vaccinations are fully up to date.

If your horse is currently vaccinated, we recommend a booster if it has been longer than 6 months since your horse's last vaccination.

It is crucial for all members to be vigilant and follow recommended guidelines on how to detect and prevent the spread of this infectious disease.

Look out for signs of disease which can include high temperature, cough, snotty nose, enlarged glands (under the lower jaw), swollen or sore eyes, depression, loss of appetite and swelling in the lower legs.

If you see any of these signs, isolate the horse and call your vet immediately. DO NOT attend WES events if your horse shows any of these signs!

It is essential that any horses showing signs of possible equine flu, or horses that might have been in contact with possibly infected horses, do not travel to competitions or other events where there will be groups of horses. If your horse has been in contact with an infected horse we suggest that you should take immediate veterinary advice.

If your horse is currently vaccinated, but it has been longer than 6 months since the last vaccination, we recommend that you discuss a booster that is effective against this strain of flu with your vet.

The BEF also has guidance on its website regarding equine infectious diseases and is urging owners to take the necessary precautions to avoid their horses becoming infected



First Dream Catcher aka Teddy

When my old Appy mare reached the age of 20, I decided to look around for another horse to take over from her when she retired (or so I thought) .. I am of course still riding her at age 32, but that's another story!

When I first saw Teddy, he had been rounded up off the Dorset moors with his dam, and corralled in a pen for me to look at. He had had very little human handling and was only a couple of months old. I was first attracted to his breeding, being a Great Grandson of Dream finder, and a Great, Great Grandson of First Draft.

We collected him two months later, having been taught to lead and tie at just four months; we loaded him into our trailer and took him home. He was a late foal, being born in June, so at four months of age he had grown a thick woolly chocolate coat, and had already been christened Teddy by his breeder.

He was naturally suspicious of people, but we gradually gained his trust and started to do simple groundwork exercises with him and worked through the Parelli 7 games with him. He was very smart and was loading at 6 months, and was ponied out from our senior QH mare Peppy, taking everything in his stride.



Backing was not an issue, he was not really phased by anything, and now his schooling and training could start in earnest. We introduced him to Trail obstacles, and began working on the process of exaggerating his western paces, although also being descended from a great Pleasure horse Zippo Pine Bar, he was already "slow legged".

My husband Paul had in the meantime bought himself another Quarter Horse, Twister, as Peppy had sadly been diagnosed with navicular. Unfortunately, Twister then went lame, and it was discovered he had bone cysts in both stifles, and was put on box rest and recovery for 12 months after undergoing surgery to remove them. This left Paul without a horse to ride, and I had in the meantime imported for myself an Appaloosa mare (Machos Taunee Star, aka Toadie) from the USA, as I did not feel ready to take Teddy on at this stage.

Paul started to increase the level of difficulty in Teddy's training, and being quite competitive wanted him to perform. Teddy being Teddy, rather than choose the easy option he started to become inconsistent in his performance, and unreliable at shows, he was easily distracted and if you lost his mind you had no chance in getting anything of any quality from him.

After a particularly disappointing performance at a show, Paul decided to give up on showing him and he pretty much retired to being a field ornament at the grand old age of 10!

When I suddenly lost Toad in a freak stable accident in November 2016, I was totally devastated. I knew in my heart that I could never replace her, as I believed no horse would ever compare for me. However, I decided that rather than try to replace her I would try to bring Teddy back into work.

Well after losing my confidence with him all those years ago I decided to send him to my Trainer Susie Anderson to bring him back into work, and get him fit, after what had essentially been almost four years off.

I went to see his progress every week, and after watching Susie ride him, I was happy to get on and have a lesson. It took some getting used to after riding tall and elegant Toad to riding small and compact Teddy, but with memories of past fears in my head, at least I was closer to the ground if I was going to part Company suddenly!

It has been a very challenging journey for us, and at times I nearly gave up altogether, having received some traumatic news about a close friend and colleague that resulted in us having to close our business of 15 years. I wasn't sure whether I could take Teddy on, and even considered selling him and buying something "easier".



Over the next 12 months I had various schooling issues with him, not going forward, breaking gait, bucking, baulking, and basically not trying. However, I refused to give up, and knowing that there was nothing physically wrong with him, I was determined that this talented little horse would be my next competition horse whatever happened!

Last year at the 2018 Spring Wake Up show, he surprised me by not putting a foot wrong. He was calm, quiet and listening to me during every class. I was super proud of him, and actually ended up winning the Walk Jog High Point Trophy sponsored by WES Area 8. Something that I was extremely proud to win, in our first proper showing season together.

It amazes me that I have owned this little horse for 15 years now and yet our partnership is only just beginning to blossom, I guess I had always loved him, stuck up for him, defended him and praised him when others had given up on him, and he had gained a reputation on the show circuit for being a "difficult horse".

He has taught me so much, and I'm so glad I got to know him properly.





Howdy y'all

In February this year, I was delighted to take the reins as volunteer County Representative for Berkshire (WES Area 8).

As a WES member of three years, and a follower for many more, some of you may know me from volunteering at the WES Nationals, or as a spectator or volunteer at one of Area 13's events, or more recently through Area 8's AGM and Berkshire/ Surrey Social.

A bit about me...

A former English rider from a young age, for many years I'd been passionate about paint horses and western riding, however opportunities to access western riding as a nonhorse owner were few and far between back then, more so than today.



Some years later in 2004, on a trip to Canada, I experienced my first western trail ride on a grey Arab mare called Nicky.

Since then I have created many more great memories, met many new friends, and been on many more trail rides along the way, at The White Stallion, Tanque Verde and Tombstone Monument Ranches in the US, and here in the UK.

Whilst I have many memorable western riding experiences, some of my most memorable include:

- a mule ride into the depths of the aweinspiring Bryce Canyon;
- having my photo taken on a horse I'd just met, adjacent to a substantial drop off at John Ford Point looking across the spectacular Monument Valley;
- on my 40th birthday loping into The White Stallion Ranch's huge arena carrying the Union Jack flag, in front of an audience of guests on a horse I'd not ridden previously with a brief on what to do 2 minutes before;



• and riding in my first WES show (Area 13) as a competitor at Burley Villa.



Home for me is in Berkshire where I live with my husband and our cat, and where I run my career coaching business.

I'm still to fulfil a life-long dream of horse ownership. Until then, I am fortunate to be able to access western riding/tuition with Tammy Greaves in The New Forest, and to get even more involved in WES where I can.

My hopes as Berkshire County Representative...

In my capacity as County Representative, representing Berkshire members, I recognise that there has been limited opportunities for Berkshire western enthusiasts (members and non-members) to access WES activities in the Berkshire, and Surrey counties of Area 8.




Unfortunately, only two of the horses fell into this category so I felt it was best to cancel until the 23rd March clinic.
